GNAC RED LION PLAYER OF THE WEEK: Riley Stockton, Seattle Pacific (G, 6-4, 200, So., Spokane, WA - Ferris) scored 19 points and also had 19 rebounds, 11 assists and just two turnovers and also played stellar defense as the Falcons swept Alaska Anchorage and Alaska Fairbanks. Stockton finished the regular-season as the conference leader in rebounds, averaging 7.6 per game. He also ended up seventh in assists (3.8) and third in assist/turnover ratio (2.8).

Quote: “(Riley’s) the guy that leads us in minutes because its hard to ever take him off the floor. He’s our best rebounder and he always guards the other team’s best player. In our minds, he is the one that kind of holds it all together for us,” SPU head Ryan Looney said.

“His the leading rebounder in the conference and when you look at it, it’s simple. Riley is one of the most competitive and coachable kinds I’ve ever had. All it took was to tell him one time that we needed him to be very, very good in a couple areas for our team to be great, and those were defense and rebounding. He immediately bought into that.”

HONORABLE MENTION: Roger O’Neill, Saint Martin’s (F, 6-5, Sr., Edmonds) scored 36 points, including 23 in a 82-71 road win at Central Washington. It was the Saints’ first win at Ellensburg since 2007 ... Mark McLaughlin, Central Washington (G, 6-6, Jr., Bothell, WA – Inglemoor) had 49 points, 29 in a 107-87 win over Western Oregon clinching the Wildcats a playoff berth ... Kenny Jones, Northwest Nazarene (G, 6-2, 195, Sr., Los Angeles, CA) scored 41 points on 15 of 26 shooting as the Crusaders closed their season with two wins ... Paul Jones, Western Washington (6-4, Sr., Kent, WA – Kent-Meridian)

had 19 points, nine rebounds and four assists and made seven of nine field goal attempts in the Vikings' 67-56 win over Simon Fraser in a nationally televised game on CBS Sports Network.

BY THE INCH AND POUND: Riley Stockton is the shortest and lightest rebound leader in GNAC history. At 6-4, he is one inch shorter than Alaska Fairbanks' Joshua Rockett (6-5, 235) who won the 2007 rebound title and to Saint Martin's Blake Poole (6-5, 225) who won three rebound titles between 2009 and 2011. His listed weight is also five pounds less than Humboldt State's Fred Hooks (6-6, 205), the 2002 and 2003 rebound champion and the Lumberjacks' Kevin Johnson (6-6, 205), the 2005 and 2006 leader.

HISTORIC COMEBACK: Alaska Anchorage rallied from a 22-point first half deficit to beat Montana State Billings 71-69 on a three-pointer by Teancum Stafford with 6.7 seconds remaining. It was the largest ever first-half deficit that UAA has overcome to win in school history.

BEST IN THE GNAC: Western Washington is the winningest team in GNAC history. The Vikings' 17 conference wins this season better the old record of 16 by Alaska Anchorage (2007-08), Central Washington (2010-11) and last year's Viking team. Western Washington set the record for most victories in all games last year with 31. The previous record was 29 by Alaska Anchorage during the 2007-08.

TEAM NOTES

Alaska Anchorage: Teancum Stafford scored 36 points as the Seawolves split two contests. Stafford made five of 10 three-pointers including the game-winner with 6.7 seconds in a 71-69 win at MSU Billings. Just as noteworthy, Kyle Fossman didn't make a trey in three attempts ending his string of games with a three-pointer at 31.

Alaska Fairbanks: Pat Voeut had 30 points, 11 assists and nine rebounds in relatively close road losses at Montana State Billings and Seattle Pacific.

Central Washington: In addition to his 49 points, McLaughlin also had 18 rebounds in CWU's final two contests of the regular-season. His league-leading 22.4 scoring average is the eighth highest in GNAC history.

Montana State Billings: David Arnold scored 38 points and Omar McDade had 34 as the Yellowjackets split two games. The two players combined to make 13 of 20 three-pointers. Arnold converted on six of nine and McDade was seven of 11.

Northwest Nazarene: In addition to Kenny Jones (See *Player of the Week* notes), Kevin Rima (27 points), Jonathan Hawkins (24 points) and Keith Moilanen (20 points) averaged in double figures. Rima also had 24 rebounds.

Saint Martin's: Roger O'Neill finished his career in 36th place on the GNAC all-time career scoring list with 1,186 points. He'll likely slip to 37th Friday as Seattle Pacific center Andy Poling trails O'Neill, who ranks 14th in SMU history, by just one point.

Seattle Pacific: Jobi Wall scored 38 points, connecting on eight of 11 three-pointers and all eight of his foul shots in home wins over the two Alaska schools. David Downs had 21 points in the two contests.

Simon Fraser: Taylor Dunn had 21 points in the Clan's 11-point road loss at Western Washington Saturday. SFU, which got 13 rebounds from Ibrahim Appiah, led by two at halftime.

Western Oregon: Andy Avgi netted 49 points, shooting 61.5 percent from the floor (16-26) and 94.4 from the foul line (17-18) in two road losses.

Western Washington: The Vikings matched the second longest home win streak in GNAC history with their victory over Simon Fraser Saturday. WWU has won 24 straight at Sam Carver Gymnasium. Humboldt State set the record of 25 between Nov. 24, 2001 and Feb. 27, 2003 and also won 24 in a row between Nov. 15, 2003 and Jan. 13, 2005.

PERFECT STARTS: Western Washington is just the second team in GNAC history to complete the first half of its conference season unbeaten. Alaska Anchorage accomplished that feat in the 2007-08 season. Only two teams have gone 9-0 in the second half – the 2001-02 Western Washington team which didn't qualify for the playoffs and the 2007-08 Central Washington squad. WWU's women also finished the first half 9-0, the first time men's and women's teams at the same school had been unbeaten at the midway point of their conference schedules.

GNAC FINISHES AT .726: GNAC teams completed the non-conference portion of their schedules with a .726 winning percentage (61-23), the second best mark in the 12-year history of the conference. Conference teams were 36-20 in Division II contests, including 25-14 in regional counters (16-12 against the PacWest, 2-1 against CCAA teams and 7-1 in games against schools that count as regional counters due to the NCAA "contiguous" state rule). Nine of the 10 conference teams posted winning records in the non-conference portion of their schedules. The 10th school – Saint Martin's – finished with a .500 non-conference record.

PREVIOUS RED LION PLAYERS OF THE WEEK

Week of Nov. 5-11: David Downs, Seattle Pacific (G, 6-2, Jr., Kirkland, WA – Bellevue Christian) was named the Most Valuable Player leading the Falcons to the team title in Sodexo Tip Off Classic at Brougham Pavilion. Downs scored 31 points and also had a team-high nine assists as SPU debuted with 20- and 19-point victories. Downs made eight of 14 shots, including four of eight treys. He also led SPU with three steals and had just two turnovers.

Week of Nov. 12-18: Pat Voeut, Alaska Fairbanks (G, 5-11, Jr., Bellingham, WA – Whatcom CC) scored 46 points and also had 19 assists, nine rebounds and five steals leading the Nanooks to the team title in the GCI Alaska Invitational at Fairbanks. Voeut, who was named the tournament's Most Valuable Player, made 17 of 26 shots, including three of six three-pointers.

Week of Nov. 19-25: Andy Avgi, Western Oregon (F, 6-5, Fr., Woodburn, OR) scored 52 points and also had 15 rebounds in earning MVP honors in the Capital City Classic. Avgi, who leads the GNAC in field goal percentage shooting 71.0 percent (44 of 62), made 20 of 25 shots (including 10 of 11 against Corban), including his only three-pointer. He also blocked two shots and had three steals.

Week of Nov. 26-Dec. 2: Devon Alexander, Western Oregon (G, 6-1, Fr., Fontana, CA) came off the bench to score 48 points, including 28 in a 118-113 triple overtime win over Central Washington Saturday as the Wolves extended their win streak to six games with a pair of home victories. Alexander scored nine of WOU's 13 points in the decisive third overtime period. He also had 13 steals, including a GNAC-record tying eight (for conference contests) in a 92-84 win against Northwest Nazarene Thursday. In the two contests, Alexander made 16 of 29 shots, including four of six three-pointers. He also converted on 12 of 13 foul shots, grabbed eight rebounds and had four assists.

Week of Dec. 3-9: Kenny Jones, Northwest Nazarene (G, 6-2, Sr., Los Angeles, CA) scored 43 points in wins over College of Idaho and New Hope Christian. Jones had 27 against the Coyotes, making nine of 16 shots as NNU extended its win streak over its county rivals to seven. He then netted 16 points and had four steals in a 20-point win over New Hope Christian.

Week of Dec. 10-16: Jarrell Crayton, MSU Billings (F, 6-7, Sr., Bellevue, NE – Boise State) had 14 points and 14 rebounds accounting for 23.0 and 36.8 percent of team totals in a 71-61 loss at Grand Canyon. Crayton made seven of 13 shots and also had a pair of steals. Crayton's rebound total was the most for a MSUB player since Robert Mayes grabbed 15 against SPU on Feb. 18.

Week of Dec. 17-23: John Allen, Western Washington (G, 190, Sr., Brier, WA – Mountlake Terrace) scored 47 points leading the Vikings to wins over 14th ranked Drury (72-69) and Central Oklahoma (103-74) in the South Point Holiday

Hoop Classic in Las Vegas. Allen, who was named the tournament's MVP, made 14 of 28 shots, including nine of 17 three-point shots. He also had six assists and three steals. The two wins extended WWU's win streak to 15, matching the second longest in school and GNAC history.

Week of Dec. 24-30: Paul Jones, Western Washington (F, 6-4, Sr., Kent, WA – Whatcom CC) scored 26 points and also had six rebounds and a pair of blocks to lead Western Washington to a 98-62 win over Thompson Rivers Sunday as the Vikings extended their win streak to 16. That is the second longest win streak in GNAC history and is also the second longest in WWU school history. The Vikings have also won 15 straight home games, which equals the sixth longest streak in conference history.

Week of Dec. 31-Jan. 6: Pat Voeut, Alaska Fairbanks (G, 5-11, 170, Jr., Bellingham, WA – Whatcom CC) and Roger O'Neill, Saint Martin's (F, 6-5, Sr., Edmonds, WA - Meadowdale) ... Voeut scored 31 points in a pair of road wins as the Nanooks snapped a 17-game losing streak on opponents' home courts with victories at Central Washington (82-75) and Northwest Nazarene (74-55). Voeut converted on 12 of 20 shots and also led his team in assists (8) and steals (6). O'Neill tied his career high with 24 points in a 71-59 home win against Western Oregon Saturday. He scored SMU's first nine points of the game and finished the first half with 16 points as the Saints built a 39-23 lead at the break.

Week of Jan. 7-13: Dominique Brinson, Alaska Fairbanks (G, 6-2, 180, Sr., Juneau, AK – College of the Redwoods) scored 44 points, including 28 in a 89-56 win over Western Oregon, as the Nanooks ran their win streak to six games with a pair of home victories. Brinson blistered the nets for a 61.5 percentage (16 of 26) converting on nine of 17 treys. He made six of eight from the arc against the Wolves while also adding seven rebounds and six assists in Saturday's victory.

Week of Jan. 14-20: John Allen, Western Washington (G, 6-1, 190, Sr., Brier, WA – Mountlake Terrace) scored 46 points including 38 in the Vikings' 91-81 road win at Western Oregon Thursday. His 38 points against the Wolves was most by a GNAC player in nearly two years. In the two games he made 17 of 29 field goals attempts, including 6 of 10 three-pointers. He also had 10 assists, eight rebounds and three steals.

Week of Jan. 21-27: Jobi Wall, Seattle Pacific (W, 6-6, 215, Jr., Arvada, CO) scored 43 points, acquiring all but four from the arc where he made 13 of 19 (68.4 percent). Wall had a career-high 28 points in Thursday's 78-72 overtime win over Western Oregon, connecting on eight of 10 treys, one shy of the school-record. He made five of nine three-pointers and had 15 points in Saturday's 82-54 rout of Saint Martin's.

Seawolves to wins over Central Washington (98-69) and Northwest Nazarene (73-72). He made 14 of 28 shots, including seven of 13 three-pointers extending his string of games with a three-pointer to 27. He also had 12 rebounds, posting a career-high nine against the Wildcats, and a team-best four steals. Fossman currently ranks 37th in GNAC history in three-pointers made (134) and sixth in three-point percentage (46.0) ... Bragg, who leads the GNAC in double-doubles with five, scored 20 points and had 11 rebounds in Saturday's overtime win over Seattle Pacific. On Thursday, he blocked four shots to key WWU's defensive effort in an 86-69 win against MSU Billings. Over his last five games, he is shooting 68.4 percent from the field (26-38) and 89.5 percent from the foul line (17-19). He has had at least one block (13 total) and at least one steal (14 total) in seven consecutive games.

Week of Feb. 4-10: Richard Woodworth, Western Washington (G, 6-3, 185, Jr., Bellevue, WA - Newport) and Sergej Pucar, Alaska Fairbanks (C, 6-11, 265, Jr., Belgrade, Serbia) Woodworth scored 26 points as the Vikings ran their win streak to 28 games with a 92-82 win at Central Washington Saturday. In two games, Woodworth netted 45 points, hitting 16 of 26 shots, including four of nine three-pointers. He also had eight rebounds and team-highs of five assists and four steals Pucar led the Nanooks to a road sweep at Western Oregon (80-77) and Saint Martin's (68-67 in overtime) scoring 36 points. Pucar made 13 of 22 field goal attempts, including four of eight three-pointers. He also had nine rebounds, three assists and two steals as the Nanooks moved into a tie for third place in the GNAC standings with Alaska Anchorage going into a contest this coming Saturday against their arch-rivals in Anchorage.

Week of Feb. 11-17: David Arnold, MSU Billings (G, 6-2, 195, Sr., Highlands Ranch, CO) scored 46 points, including 35 in a 83-78 win over Central Washington Saturday. Arnold made seven of 11 three-pointers and all eight of his free throw attempts against the Wildcats. Including Thursday's 87-63 win over Northwest Nazarene, Arnold made 10 of 17 three-point shots. He also had seven rebounds and six assists in the two victories as the Yellowjackets moved into fifth place in the GNAC standings.

Pucar shot 53.6 percent from the floor (15-28) and made six of 10 treys, as the Nanooks won a pair of games. Pucar also had 15 rebounds and blocked four shots.
