**GNAC RED LION PLAYER OF THE WEEK:** David Downs, Seattle Pacific (G, 6-2, Sr., Kirkland, WA – Bellevue Christian) scored 64 points, including 36 in a 91-88 win over No. 24 Western Washington and 28 in a 89-79 victory over Simon Fraser, as the Falcons extended their win streak to 11 games. Downs, who had 10 assists and just one turnover, made 19 of 34 field goal attempts, including 10 of 17 three-pointers. He also made 16 of 19 foul shots. Seven of his assists came against the Vikings as he moved into third place on SPU's all-time playmaker list with 538.

**HONORABLE MENTION:** Stefan Tica, Alaska Fairbanks (F, 6-7, Sr., Belgrade, Serbia - Panola) made seven of 13 three-pointers and scored 36 points as the Nanooks evened their road record at 5-5 with a triple overtime win at Northwest Nazarene before rallying from a 26-point first half deficit to beat Central Washington ... Travis Thompson, Alaska Anchorage (G, 6-1, Jr., Anchorage, AK – Dimond) scored 50 points and also had 10 assists to lead the Seawolves to road wins at CWU and NNU. Thompson shot 58.1 percent from the floor (18-of-31 including 8-of-19 from the arc) ... Richard Woodworth, Western Washington (G, 6-3, 195, Sr., Bellevue, WA - Newport) scored 51 points and had 10 assists in the Vikings' two road losses at Billings and Seattle. Woodworth was 17-of-30 from the field.

**MORE MENTIONABLES:** Andy Avgi, Western Oregon (F, 6-6, So., Woodburn, OR) had a pair of double-doubles in wins over Northwest Nazarene (12 points, 11 rebounds) and Saint Martin's (21 points, 11 rebounds). Avgi missed just four shots (9-of-13) in the two contests as the Wolves moved into a tie for fifth in the GNAC with Central Washington ... Jonathan Mesghna, MSU Billings (F, 6-6, Sr., Frankfurt, Germany – U. of Maine) scored 47 points on 17 of 22 shooting, including 10 of 13 from the arc in the Yellowjackets' home wins over No. 22 Western Washington and Simon Fraser ... Mario Donaldson, Northwest Nazarene (G, 6-3, Sr., Rockton, IL) had 47 points, 14 rebounds and 10 assists in three contests including Monday's makeup against Western Oregon.

**FROM THE RECORD BOOK:** Alaska Anchorage (19) and Central Washington (14) combined for 33 three-pointers in UAA's 96-89 win at Ellensburg. That is the third highest total in GNAC history and the most in a conference contest ... The Alaska Fairbanks – Northwest Nazarene triple overtime time was the fourth in GNAC history. There has also been two four-overtime games.

## TEAM NOTES

**Alaska Anchorage:** Travis Thompson had 31 points – his fifth 30-point game of the season – and a key steal in the final minute in UAA's win Thursday at Ellensburg. His steal came with less than 30 seconds to go and the Seawolves leading by just three points. In addition to Thompson's 50 points, UAA got 32 points each from Kyle Fossman (10-of-22 from the arc) and Teancum Stafford (7-of-11 from the arc).

**Alaska Fairbanks:** Andrew Kelly had 34 points and 24 rebounds in the Nanooks two road wins. UAF, which had one of greatest comebacks in GNAC history rallying from a 26-point deficit to beat CWU, also got 39 points and a team-high five steals from Ronnie Baker. UAF shot 51.1 percent (24-of-47) from the arc in their two victories.

**Central Washington:** Sophomore guard Jordan Russell came off the bench to score 41 points in CWU's two games. Russell made 15-of-26 shots, including 8-of-13 treys. Mark McLaughlin had 39 points and 11 of CWU's 28 assists. JB Pillard had 22 points (9-of-13 field goals) and a team-high 16 rebounds.

**Montana State Billings:** Three MSUB players averaged 20 points a game as the Yellowjackets stayed in the playoff race with wins over WWU and Simon Fraser. Austin Hudson and Jonathan Mesghna each had 47 points and Kalob Hatcher had 43 points and 24 of MSUB's 35 assists. Led by Hudson with 19 rebounds, the Yellowjackets' outrebounded their opponents 71-54.

**Northwest Nazarene:** Mario Donaldson (47 points), Kevin Rima (45) and Derek Isaak (41) accounted for 60 percent of NNU's scoring (133 of 222) in three contests. The Crusaders were also led by Grayson Moore with 34 points and 27 rebounds.

**Saint Martin's:** Evan Coulter and Isaac Bianchini led the Saints with 14 and 12 points each as the Saints lost at home to Western Oregon. Coulter also led the SMU with eight rebounds, four assists and four steals.

**Seattle Pacific:** Patrick Simon (53.7) and David Downs (50.0) rank 1-2 in NCAA Division II in three-point shooting. Simon, who is also the GNAC career percentage leader (49.3), made 6-of-8 and Downs converted on 10-of-17 as the Falcons extended their win streak to 11 games and their conference game home win streak to 16, the fourth longest in GNAC history.

**Simon Fraser:** Sango Niang had 53 points and nine assists in road losses at Seattle Pacific and MSU Billings. Niang made 20 of 31 shots. David Gebru led SFU with 12 rebounds and also had 29 points.

**Western Oregon:** The Wolves outscored the Saints 29-4 from the foul line in their eight-point road win at Saint Martin's as Andy Avgi, who had 21 points and 11 rebounds, made 9-of-10. In two contests, WOU was outscored 60-24 from the arc but had a 46-14 advantage from the foul line.

**Western Washington:** In addition to Woodworth's 51 points (See *Player of the Week Honorable Mention* lists), the Vikings also got 37 points and 11 rebounds from Jeffrey Parker and 32 points and nine rebounds from Austin Bragg. Bragg made 12-of-18 shots, including 2-of-3 from the arc.

**GNAC SPLITS 28 GAMES WITH PACWEST:** GNAC teams posted a 54-34 record (.614) in the non-conference portion of their schedule. That percentage ranks just ninth during the 13-year history of the conference and is the second lowest since the 2006-07 season. GNAC teams finished 29-28 against Division II non-conference opponents, including 24-25 in regional contests. The GNAC split 28 games with the PacWest (14-14), lost six of nine games against the CCAA and posted a 7-5 record in games that count as regional contests under the NCAA "contiguous" state rule.

## PREVIOUS RED LION PLAYERS OF THE WEEK

**Week of Nov. 3-10** - David Downs, Seattle Pacific (G, 6-2, 195, Sr., Kirkland, WA – Bellevue Christian) was selected the MVP in the CCA (Conference Commissioners Association) Division II Tipoff Classic as he led the Falcons to a 3-0 record. Downs averaged 25 points, shooting 62.1 percent from the field (18-29) and 76.5 percent from the arc (13-17). He also made 26 of 29 free throws (89.7 percent). In addition he led SPU with 11 assists and also had seven rebounds.

**Week of Nov. 11-17** - Mark McLaughlin, Central Washington (G, 6-6, Sr., Bothell, WA - Inglemoor) scored 60 points in a pair of contests, including 42 in a 95-90 win over Colorado Christian to earn all-tournament honors in the SPU Sodexo Tipoff tournament. That equaled the ninth highest point total in GNAC history and was the most since John Allen of Western Washington and Parrish West of Alaska Fairbanks had 43-point games in January, 2011. McLaughlin made 17 field goals against CCU, one off the GNAC single-game record of 18 by Gerrit Eades of Saint Martin's against Alaska Anchorage in 2002.

**Week of Nov. 18-24** - Ronnie Baker, Alaska Fairbanks (G, 6-3, Sr., Vallejo, CA – Diablo Valley) scored 59 points and also had 16 rebounds, 12 assists and four steals in leading the Nanooks to three wins and the tournament title in the GCI Alaska Invitational at Fairbanks. Baker, who was named to the all-tournament team, scored a career-high 29 points in Saturday's 83-72 win over Fresno Pacific. For the tournament, Baker shot 54.1 percent from the floor (20-37), 53.8 percent from the three-point line (7-13) and 80 percent from the foul line (12-15).

**Week of Nov. 25-Dec.1:** Austin Bragg, Western Washington (C, 6-9, Sr., Longview, WA – Clark CC) scored 20 points and also had 13 rebounds and five blocked shots to lead the Vikings to a 72-69 win over No. 1 ranked Metro State. Bragg hit a driving layup with 11.8 seconds to give WWU, which extended its home court win streak to a school and GNAC-record 31 games, a four-point lead.

**Week of Dec. 2-8:** Brian McGill, Alaska Anchorage (G, 6-2, So., Clackamas, OR) scored 29 points and also had 10 assists to lead the Seawolves to a 96-76 win over Alaska Fairbanks Saturday at the Wells Fargo Sports Complex. McGill, a transfer from Western Oregon, made eight of 12 shots, including two of two three-pointers. He also converted on 11 of 12 foul shots. On the season, McGill ranks fifth in the GNAC in scoring (17.2) and second in assists (6.2).

**Week of Dec. 9-15:** Grayson Moore, Northwest Nazarene (G, 6-6, So., Logan, UT – Sheridan College) had back-to-back career highs in scoring 47 points as the Crusaders split two games. He scored 22 points and also had nine rebounds, three assists, three blocks and a steal in a 79-62 loss to College of Idaho Wednesday. Moore accounted for 35.5 percent of the Crusaders' points and 26.5 percent of its rebounds in the contest. He converted on six of 10 three-pointers as NNU cashed in on 11 of 27 overall. Moore

followed that up with a 25-point, seven-rebound performance Saturday in an 88-82 win over Walla Walla. He made four of seven treys in that contest finishing the week with a 58.8 percentage from the arc (10 of 17) after beginning the week shooting just 21.6 percent on treys (8 of 37).

**Week of Dec. 16-22:** Rodney Webster, Western Oregon (G, 6-1, Sr., Hanford, CA – Hanford West & Fresno City CC) came off the bench to lead the Wolves in scoring (35), assists (9) and steals (5) as WOU ran its win streak to four games with a pair of victories, including a 84-76 regional counting-win over South Dakota Mines. Webster also had eight rebounds, the third most on the team, and shot 56 percent from the field (14-25) including three of four from beyond the three-point arc. He also had one of WOU's two blocks as the Wolves evened their regional record at 4-4.

**Week of Dec. 30-Jan. 5:** Riley Carel, Saint Martin's (G, 6-2, Jr., Enumclaw, WA) and Andrew Kelly, Alaska Fairbanks (F, 6-7, Sr., Gilbert, AZ – Chandler-Gilbert) ... Carel scored 29 points, including 17 in the Saints' 73-69 win over nationally 11<sup>th</sup> ranked Seattle Pacific as the Saints beat the Falcons for just the third time in the 13-year history of the conference. Carel also had career highs for assists (8) and steals (5) in the win, while also grabbing six rebounds and making seven of 12 shots. Kelly scored 26 points and also had 19 rebounds and three blocked shots in wins over Simon Fraser (67-58) and nationally 15<sup>th</sup> ranked Western Washington (65-61) as the Nanooks beat the Vikings at The Patty Center for the second year in a row.

**Week of Jan. 6-12:** Mark McLaughlin, Central Washington (G, 6-6, Sr., Bothell, WA – Inglemoor & Tacoma CC) scored 66 points, including 39 in a 106-103 double overtime win over Western Oregon. McLaughlin, who is averaging nearly 30 points per game (29.4) in five conference contests and 26.3 overall, made seven of nine three-pointers in the two contests, including a trey with 10 seconds left in the first overtime to force the second extra five-minute period against WOU. Overall, he connected on 17 of 34 shots and 25 of 26 foul shots, including 16 of 16 against the Wolves.

**Week of Jan. 13-19:** Patrick Simon, Seattle Pacific (F, 6-8, Sr., Ephrata, WA) scored 42 points, including 29 in a *ROOT SPORTS* regionally-televised game against Western Washington to lead the Falcons to a 76-60 win over the 19<sup>th</sup> ranked Vikings, halting WWU's GNAC and school-record home winning streak at 36 games. Simon shot 72.7 percent from the floor (16 of 22), missing just once (6 of 7) from the three-point line where he has the fourth best career percentage in GNAC history, converting 109 of 232 (47.0 percent). Simon also had 12 rebounds in two contests, including a game-high seven in a 73-49 win Saturday at Simon Fraser. He also contributed four steals to SPU's two victories, its first two wins this season on an opponent's home court.

**Week of Jan. 20-26:** Mark McLaughlin, Central Washington (G, 6-6, Sr., Bothell, WA – Inglemoor &

Tacoma CC) and Travis Thompson, Alaska Anchorage (G, 6-1, Jr., Anchorage, AK) ... McLaughlin became just the second player in GNAC history to record back-to-back 40-point games scoring 83 points. He was efficient in producing 43 points in a 99-94 loss to Western Washington and 40 points in a 96-79 win against Simon Fraser, shooting 68.3 percent from the floor (28-of-41), including 5-of-9 three-pointers. McLaughlin, who leads Division II in scoring averaging 28.3 points per game, also made 22-of-26 free throws, extending his streak of foul shots made to 42 before missing late in Thursday's contest ... For the second straight week, Thompson scored 56 points in a pair of contests increasing his career total to 1,004 and becoming the 58<sup>th</sup> player in GNAC to reach 1,000. He had 29 points in a 92-58 win at Western Oregon and 27 in a 79-78 victory at Saint Martin's. In the latter game, he also drew a charge with seven seconds left to secure the win. Thompson, who had six rebounds, five assists and a team-high four steals, shot 59.3 percent from the floor (16-of-27), 52.6 percent from the arc (10-of-19) and 93.3 percent from the foul line (14-of-15).

**Week of Jan. 27-Feb. 2:** Austin Bragg, Western Washington (F, 6-9, Sr., Longview, WA - Clark CC) had 31 points, 26 rebounds and 13 assists and recorded the first triple-double in the GNAC in 10 years in leading the Vikings to wins over Alaska Fairbanks (53-51) and Alaska Anchorage (99-76). Bragg had one-third of WWU's points (18 of 53) and rebounds (14 of 42) in Thursday's win against the Nanooks before recording the third triple-double (13 points, 12 rebounds, 10 assists) in GNAC history in Saturday's regionally televised win over Alaska Anchorage. In the two contests, Bragg made 12 of 20 field goal attempts and all five of his free throw attempts.

**Week of Feb. 3-9:** Austin Hudson, MSU Billings (F, 6-7, Jr., Salt Lake City, UT - Central Wyoming) scored 47 points and had 32 rebounds as the Yellowjackets split two games, earning their first win at Anchorage since Jan. 29, 1998 ... Hudson scored 24 points and had 22 rebounds, including a GNAC record 13 offensive caroms, in a 88-74 loss Thursday at Alaska Fairbanks. He then led MSUB to a 75-62 win against Alaska Anchorage scoring 23 points and grabbing 10 rebounds. In the two games, Hudson made 20 of 32 shots (62.5 percent) and also had four assists, four steals and two blocks. Half of his 32 rebounds came off the offensive glass. His 22 rebounds at UAF equal the second highest individual single-game total in GNAC history.
