FALCONS REPEAT AS GNAC CHAMPIONS: David Downs was selected the GNAC Tournament MVP for the second year in a row as he scored 44 points, including 26 in Saturday's 65-62 win over Western Washington which earned the Falcons an automatic berth in this week's NCAA West Regional. He also had nine rebounds and seven assists in leading the Falcons to their second straight GNAC post-season tournament championship. They've also won or shared five regular-season titles (2002, 2006, 2007, 2010 and 2014).

SPU EARNS SECOND SEED: Seattle Pacific, which is making its 10th straight West Region appearance, the longest current streak in Division II, earned the second seed in the West Region ... SPU was 4-2 against other West Region teams this season (2-1 against the PacWest and 2-1 against the CCAA). They were 0-2 against other regional qualifiers, losing to both fourth-seed Chico State and sixth-seed Dixie State ... SPU is the GNAC's lone representative in the region. Previously the conference, which provided both finalists in each of the past two tournaments, has never had fewer than two and has averaged three.

ELITE 8 AT EVANSVILLE: The winner of the regional tournament will advance to the NCAA Elite 8 at the Ford Center in Evansville, Indiana. The national quarterfinals begin March 26. The championship game on March 29 will be televised by CBS. SPU's has made one Elite 8 appearance as a member of the GNAC losing in the 2006 semifinals.

INDIVIDUAL SINGLE-GAME RECORDS: Western Oregon's Jordan Wiley set conference tournament records for three-pointers made (7) and attempted (12) in the Wolves 94-88 win over Alaska Anchorage. WOU's Rodney Webster set a record in the same game making 12 total field goals.

TEAM RECORDS: Western Oregon set team tournament records for most points (94), three-pointers made (13) and attempted (26), all against Alaska Anchorage. UAA also made 13 treys in that game and had a tournament-record 34 total field goals. Western Washington tied its own tournament record, pulling down 43 rebounds against

Alaska Fairbanks. Its 21-point win over the Nanooks was the largest victory margin in the four-year history of the tournament.

CONFERENCE TOURNAMENT NOTES

Alaska Anchorage: Kyle Fossman led the Seawolves with 27 points in its opening round loss to Western Oregon, connecting on 6-of-11 three-pointers. UAA also got 18 points from Teancum Stafford, who made 5-of-8 three-pointers. Travis Thompson added 17 points making 2-of-3 treys as the Seawolves connected on 13-of-24 from the arc.

Alaska Fairbanks: Ronnie Baker had team-highs for points (26), assists (8) and steals (7) as the Nanooks split two tournament games. Sergej Pucar had 24 points, Andrew Kelly added 22 points and 15 rebounds and Stefan Tica had 21 points and 10 rebounds. Pucar finished his career ranked 65th in GNAC history with 958 points and Tica ended up 71st with 934 points ... UAF shot just 37.4 percent and was outrebounded 70-59 in its two games. Its opponents made 49.0 percent of their shots.

Montana State Billings: Austin Hudson paced the Yellowjackets with 14 points and nine rebounds in their loss to Alaska Fairbanks. Jonathan Mesghna had 13 points and Kalob Hatcher had 12 points and eight assists. Also in double figures was Devon Wallace with 11 points.

Seattle Pacific: Downs has made 49 of his last 51 free throw attempts dating back to SPU's home game Feb. 22 against MSU Billings. He was 12-of-12 in the tournament, extending his current streak to 35 ... Patrick Simon had 31 points, despite an uncharacteristic 5-of-17 from the three-point line. However, he still managed to hold on to his national lead in three-point percentage (51.0) though he did fall to second on the GNAC All-Time career three-point percentage list (48.6).

Western Oregon: Rodney Webster had 30 of his 39 points in the Wolves 94-88 win over Alaska Anchorage joining Central Washington's Mark McLaughlin (32 versus Alaska Anchorage last year) as the only players in tournament history to score 30 or more points. Jordan Wiley had 28 points and Devon Alexander had 20.

Western Washington: Freshman Jeffrey Parker had 35 points and 14 rebounds, shooting 7-of-11 from the arc. The Vikings also got 28 points from Austin Bragg. Anye Turner had a team-high 17 rebounds and matched Robert Harris for most assists with seven. Parker and Bragg each had 14 rebounds. WWU, which came into the conference tournament ranked seventh in the region, missed out on a regional playoff berth when ninth-ranked Cal State Stanislaus and unranked Chaminade earned automatic berths by winning the CCAA and PacWest tournaments.

GNAC SPLITS 28 GAMES WITH PACWEST: GNAC teams posted a 54-34 record (.614) in the non-conference portion of their schedule. That percentage ranks just ninth during the 13-year history of the conference and is the second lowest since the 2006-07 season. GNAC teams

finished 29-28 against Division II non-conference opponents, including 24-25 in regional contests. The GNAC split 28 games with the PacWest (14-14), lost six of nine games against the CCAA and posted a 7-5 record in games that count as regional contests under the NCAA "contiguous" state rule.

RED LION PLAYERS OF THE WEEK

Week of Nov. 3-10 - David Downs, Seattle Pacific (G, 6-2, 195, Sr., Kirkland, WA – Bellevue Christian) was selected the MVP in the CCA (Conference Commissioners Association) Division II Tipoff Classic as he led the Falcons to a 3-0 record. Downs averaged 25 points, shooting 62.1 percent from the field (18-29) and 76.5 percent from the arc (13-17). He also made 26 of 29 free throws (89.7 percent). In addition he led SPU with 11 assists and also had seven rebounds.

Week of Nov. 11-17 - Mark McLaughlin, Central Washington (G, 6-6, Sr., Bothell, WA - Inglemoor) scored 60 points in a pair of contests, including 42 in a 95-90 win over Colorado Christian to earn all-tournament honors in the SPU Sodexo Tipoff tournament. That equaled the ninth highest point total in GNAC history and was the most since John Allen of Western Washington and Parrish West of Alaska Fairbanks had 43-point games in January, 2011. McLaughlin made 17 field goals against CCU, one off the GNAC single-game record of 18 by Gerrit Eades of Saint Martin's against Alaska Anchorage in 2002.

Week of Nov. 18-24 - Ronnie Baker, Alaska Fairbanks (G, 6-3, Sr., Vallejo, CA – Diablo Valley) scored 59 points and also had 16 rebounds, 12 assists and four steals in leading the Nanooks to three wins and the tournament title in the GCI Alaska Invitational at Fairbanks. Baker, who was named to the all-tournament team, scored a career-high 29 points in Saturday's 83-72 win over Fresno Pacific. For the tournament, Baker shot 54.1 percent from the floor (20-37), 53.8 percent from the three-point line (7-13) and 80 percent from the foul line (12-15).

Week of Nov. 25-Dec.1: Austin Bragg, Western Washington (C, 6-9, Sr., Longview, WA – Clark CC) scored 20 points and also had 13 rebounds and five blocked shots to lead the Vikings to a 72-69 win over No. 1 ranked Metro State. Bragg hit a driving layup with 11.8 seconds to give WWU, which extended its home court win streak to a school and GNAC-record 31 games, a four-point lead.

Week of Dec. 2-8: Brian McGill, Alaska Anchorage (G, 6-2, So., Clackamas, OR) scored 29 points and also had 10 assists to lead the Seawolves to a 96-76 win over Alaska Fairbanks Saturday at the Wells Fargo Sports Complex. McGill, a transfer from Western Oregon, made eight of 12 shots, including two of two three-pointers. He also converted on 11 of 12 foul shots. On the season, McGill ranks fifth in the GNAC in scoring (17.2) and second in assists (6.2).

Week of Dec. 9-15: Grayson Moore, Northwest Nazarene (G, 6-6, So., Logan, UT – Sheridan College) had back-to-

back career highs in scoring 47 points as the Crusaders split two games. He scored 22 points and also had nine rebounds, three assists, three blocks and a steal in a 79-62 loss to College of Idaho Wednesday. Moore accounted for 35.5 percent of the Crusaders' points and 26.5 percent of its rebounds in the contest. He converted on six of 10 three-pointers as NNU cashed in on 11 of 27 overall. Moore followed that up with a 25-point, seven-rebound performance Saturday in an 88-82 win over Walla Walla. He made four of seven treys in that contest finishing the week with a 58.8 percentage from the arc (10 of 17) after beginning the week shooting just 21.6 percent on treys (8 of 37).

Week of Dec. 16-22: Rodney Webster, Western Oregon (G, 6-1, Sr., Hanford, CA – Hanford West & Fresno City CC) came off the bench to lead the Wolves in scoring (35), assists (9) and steals (5) as WOU ran its win streak to four games with a pair of victories, including a 84-76 regional counting-win over South Dakota Mines. Webster also had eight rebounds, the third most on the team, and shot 56 percent from the field (14-25) including three of four from beyond the three-point arc. He also had one of WOU's two blocks as the Wolves evened their regional record at 4-4.

Week of Dec. 30-Jan. 5: Riley Carel, Saint Martin's (G, 6-2, Jr., Enumclaw, WA) and Andrew Kelly, Alaska Fairbanks (F, 6-7, Sr., Gilbert, AZ – Chandler-Gilbert) ... Carel scored 29 points, including 17 in the Saints' 73-69 win over nationally 11th ranked Seattle Pacific as the Saints beat the Falcons for just the third time in the 13-year history of the conference. Carel also had career highs for assists (8) and steals (5) in the win, while also grabbing six rebounds and making seven of 12 shots. Kelly scored 26 points and also had 19 rebounds and three blocked shots in wins over Simon Fraser (67-58) and nationally 15th ranked Western Washington (65-61) as the Nanooks beat the Vikings at The Patty Center for the second year in a row.

Week of Jan. 6-12: Mark McLaughlin, Central Washington (G, 6-6, Sr., Bothell, WA – Inglemoor & Tacoma CC) scored 66 points, including 39 in a 106-103 double overtime win over Western Oregon. McLaughlin, who is averaging nearly 30 points per game (29.4) in five conference contests and 26.3 overall, made seven of nine three-pointers in the two contests, including a trey with 10 seconds left in the first overtime to force the second extra five-minute period against WOU. Overall, he connected on 17 of 34 shots and 25 of 26 foul shots, including 16 of 16 against the Wolves.

Week of Jan. 13-19: Patrick Simon, Seattle Pacific (F, 6-8, Sr., Ephrata, WA) scored 42 points, including 29 in a *ROOT SPORTS* regionally-televised game against Western Washington to lead the Falcons to a 76-60 win over the 19th ranked Vikings, halting WWU's GNAC and school-record home winning streak at 36 games. Simon shot 72.7 percent from the floor (16 of 22), missing just once (6 of 7) from the three-point line where he has the fourth best career percentage in GNAC history, converting 109 of 232 (47.0 percent). Simon also had 12 rebounds in two contests, including a game-high seven in a 73-49 win Saturday at

Simon Fraser. He also contributed four steals to SPU's two victories, its first two wins this season on an opponent's home court.

Week of Jan. 20-26: Mark McLaughlin, Central Washington (G, 6-6, Sr., Bothell, WA – Inglemoor & Tacoma CC) and Travis Thompson, Alaska Anchorage (G, 6-1, Jr., Anchorage, AK) ... McLaughlin became just the second player in GNAC history to record back-to-back 40-point games scoring 83 points. He was efficient in producing 43 points in a 99-94 loss to Western Washington and 40 points in a 96-79 win against Simon Fraser, shooting 68.3 percent from the floor (28-of-41), including 5-of-9 three-pointers. McLaughlin, who leads Division II in scoring averaging 28.3 points per game, also made 22-of-26 free throws, extending his streak of foul shots made to 42 before missing late in Thursday's contest ... For the second straight week, Thompson scored 56 points in a pair of contests increasing his career total to 1,004 and becoming the 58th player in GNAC to reach 1,000. He had 29 points in a 92-58 win at Western Oregon and 27 in a 79-78 victory at Saint Martin's. In the latter game, he also drew a charge with seven seconds left to secure the win. Thompson, who had six rebounds, five assists and a team-high four steals, shot 59.3 percent from the floor (16-of-27), 52.6 percent from the arc (10-of-19) and 93.3 percent from the foul line (14-of-15).

Week of Jan. 27-Feb. 2: Austin Bragg, Western Washington (F, 6-9, Sr., Longview, WA - Clark CC) had 31 points, 26 rebounds and 13 assists and recorded the first triple-double in the GNAC in 10 years in leading the Vikings to wins over Alaska Fairbanks (53-51) and Alaska Anchorage (99-76). Bragg had one-third of WWU's points (18 of 53) and rebounds (14 of 42) in Thursday's win against the Nanooks before recording the third triple-double (13 points, 12 rebounds, 10 assists) in GNAC history in Saturday's regionally televised win over Alaska Anchorage. In the two contests, Bragg made 12 of 20 field goal attempts and all five of his free throw attempts.

Week of Feb. 3-9: Austin Hudson, MSU Billings (F, 6-7, Jr., Salt Lake City, UT – Central Wyoming) scored 47 points and had 32 rebounds as the Yellowjackets split two games, earning their first win at Anchorage since Jan. 29, 1998 ... Hudson scored 24 points and had 22 rebounds, including a GNAC record 13 offensive caroms, in a 88-74 loss Thursday at Alaska Fairbanks. He then led MSUB to a 75-62 win against Alaska Anchorage scoring 23 points and grabbing 10 rebounds. In the two games, Hudson made 20 of 32 shots (62.5 percent) and also had four assists, four steals and two blocks. Half of his 32 rebounds came off the offensive glass. His 22 rebounds at UAF equal the second highest individual single-game total in GNAC history.

Week of Feb. 10-16: David Downs, Seattle Pacific (G, 6-2, Sr., Kirkland, WA – Bellevue Christian) scored 64 points, including 36 in a 91-88 win over No. 24 Western Washington and 28 in a 89-79 victory over Simon Fraser, as the Falcons extended their win streak to 11 games. Downs, who had 10 assists and just one turnover, made 19 of 34 field goal attempts, including 10 of 17 three-pointers.

He also made 16 of 19 foul shots. Seven of his assists came against the Vikings as he moved into third place on SPU's all-time playmaker list with 538.

Week of Feb. 17-23: Kyle Fossman, Alaska Anchorage (G, 6-0, Sr., Haines, AK) and Sango Niang, Simon Fraser (G, 6-0, Jr., Paris, France - Chaffey) Fossman scored 58 points including 40 in Saturday's 96-77 win against Western Oregon, as the Seawolves clinched a GNAC post-season berth with a pair of victories. Fossman made 19 of 27 field goals, including 17 of 25 three-pointers increasing his career three-point total to 248 (5th best in GNAC history). He also set a GNAC single-game record making 12 three-pointers (in 16 attempts) against the Wolves, breaking the old conference mark of 10 shared by three players ... Niang had 63 points and 21 assists, producing a pair of double-doubles, as the Clan split two games. He scored 36 points and had 11 assists in Thursday's 112-99 win against Central Washington, scoring the second most points in GNAC history in a game in which the player also had 10 or more assists. He followed that up with a 27-point, 10-assist performance in Saturday's 98-90 loss to Northwest Nazarene. Niang made 19 of 29 field goal attempts and was perfect (20-of-20) from the foul line. His double-digit assist games were his first two of the season.

Week of Feb. 24-March 2: Andrew Kelly, Alaska Fairbanks (F, 6-7, Sr., Gilbert, AZ – Chandler-Gilbert) scored 14 points, including the game-winner in the final second, as the Nanooks ended a 16-game losing streak to Alaska Anchorage with a 70-68 win at The Patty Center. Kelly received the ball from teammate Ronnie Baker who was falling out-of-bounds and was able to get the shot up before the red light went on. The UAF forward had 18 rebounds, 10 off the offensive glass, as the Nanooks dominated the backboards 38-25 to earn its first win against UAA since Jan. 28, 2006. Kelly also had a steal and three blocks, two during a 20-5 run over the game's final 7 ½ minutes.
